ANTI-DRUG ABUSE AND VIOLENT CRIME BLOCK GRANT FUNDS **EDWARD BYRNE MEMORIAL/ JAG STATE LAW ENFORCEMENT** **ASSISTANCE FORMULA BLOCK GRANT FUNDS**

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Crime Commission

PURPOSE: To assist state and local units of government in carrying out specific drug and violent crime control programs that offer a high probability of improving the criminal justice system and making an impact on Nebraska's drug and violent crime problem. A key element of projects shall be the coordination and cooperation between various criminal justice agencies. Programs must relate to drug and violent crime control. Program areas include:

1. Demand reduction education programs in which law enforcement officers participate.
2. Multijurisdictional task force programs that integrate federal, state and local drug law enforcement agencies and prosecutors for the purpose of enhancing interagency coordination and intelligence, and facilitating multijurisdictional investigations.
3. Improvement of the operational effectiveness of the court process by expanding prosecutorial, defender, and judicial resources, and by implementing court delay reduction programs.
4. Programs designed to provide additional public correctional resources and improve the corrections system, including treatment in prisons and jails, intensive supervision programs, and long-range corrections and sentencing strategies.
5. Programs that identify and meet the treatment needs of adult and juvenile drug-dependent and alcohol-dependent offenders.
6. Innovative programs that demonstrate new and different approaches to enforcement, prosecution, and adjudication of drug offenses and other serious crimes.

ELIGIBILITY: State and local units of government are eligible to apply for funds. Private nonprofit organizations are not eligible to apply for Drug Control funding. However, state or local units of government may contract with private nonprofit agencies to implement projects.

JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION ACT – **FORMULA GRANT FUNDS**

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Crime Commission

PURPOSE: The priority areas for funding are removal of juveniles from adult jails and lockups, deinstitutionalization of and services for status offenders and non-offenders. American Indian tribal programs, systems improvement, and minority over-representation.

Jail Removal: The following activities are considered for funding under this category: 1) temporary non-secure holding services (i.e. holdovers, shelter care, attendant care, foster care, safe homes, group homes, etc.); 2) intake services; 3) treatment and aftercare programs; 4) secure detention programs; and 5) planning and technical assistance.

Deinstitutionalization/Services to Status Offenders and Non-offenders: This category provides funds for projects designed to prevent or eliminate the placement of status offenders and non-offenders in secure detention and correctional facilities. The following activities are considered for funding under this category: 1) temporary non-secure holding services (i.e. holdovers, shelter care, attendant care, foster care, safe homes, group homes, etc.); 2) prevention programs; 3) diversion programs; 4) early intervention programs; 5) community-based diagnostic evaluation services; 6) intake services; and 7) intensive supervision services.

American Indian Tribes: This category provides funds for projects designed to address the juvenile justice issues for American Indians, primarily on the Omaha and Winnebago Reservations. The following activities are considered for funding under this category: 1) temporary non-secure holding services (i.e. holdovers, shelter care, attendant care, foster care, safe homes, group homes, etc.); 2) detention alternatives; 3) treatment and aftercare programs; 4) secure detention programs; 5) planning and technical assistance; 6) prevention, intervention, and diversion services.

Minority Over-representation: This category funds projects that eliminate or reduce over-representation of minority youth in confinement in the juvenile justice system. Priority consideration is given to projects that influence the problem. The following activities are considered for funding under this category: 1) systems of alternatives to incarceration specific to the needs of minorities; 2) multicultural awareness training programs; 3) diversion and intervention programs; 4) prevention programs; 5) initiating or improving the usefulness of relevant information systems and dissemination of information regarding minorities in the juvenile justice system; 6) pilot studies to develop profiles of juvenile offenders; and 7) additional data collection and analysis relevant to this area.

Systems Improvement: This category provides funds for projects designated to address training needs, provide advocacy, and provide education related efforts to improve statutory law, policies and practices on a system level. The following activities are considered for funding under this category: 1) development and delivery of training programs/curriculum; 2) technical assistance; 3) advocacy programs; 4) standards programs; and 5) code and statutory revision initiatives.

ELIGIBILITY: To be eligible the subgrantee must be considered:

- A unit of general local government (county, city, village, etc.), or a combination of such units;
- A state agency or state-supported university;
- A chartered nonprofit private organization or association having statewide representation or character; or
- A local community chartered private nonprofit agency or organization only if a request for funds to support the proposed project through a unit of local government has been made and denied.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Amount varies. Applicants for new projects may be eligible for consideration for five years. Projects that are funded for subsequent years are subject to a step down funding policy: First two years may be funded at 100%, Third year – 75%, Fourth year – 50%, Fifth year – 25%. Projects are ineligible after receiving five years of funding.

JUVENILE SERVICES ACT GRANTS

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Crime Commission

PURPOSE: To fund programs and services for juveniles under the jurisdiction of the juvenile or criminal justice systems. Programs and services include assessment and evaluation, delinquency prevention, diversion, detention, shelter care, intensive supervision, treatment of juveniles in need of services, and dispositional alternatives.

ELIGIBILITY: To be eligible the subgrantee must be considered:

- A unit of general local government (county, city, village, etc.), or a combination of such units;
- A state-supported university;
- A chartered nonprofit private organization or association having statewide representation or character; or
- A local community chartered private nonprofit agency or organization only if a request for funds to support the proposed project through a unit of local government has been made and denied.

NOTE: State agencies are **not** eligible for this grant.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Amount varies. Applicants for new projects may be eligible for consideration for five years. Projects that are funded for subsequent years are subject to a step down funding policy: First two years may be funded at 100%, Third year – 75%, Fourth year – 50%, Fifth year – 25%. Projects are ineligible after receiving five years of funding.

VICTIM ASSISTANCE ACT BLOCK GRANT FUNDS

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Crime Commission

PURPOSE: To provide direct services to victims of crime.

ELIGIBILITY: To be eligible for Victim Assistance, a subgrantee must:

- be operated as a public agency or nonprofit organization, or a combination thereof, that provides direct services to crime victims;
- demonstrate substantial financial support from other sources;
- utilize volunteers;
- promote coordinated public and private efforts to aid crime victims;
- assist victims in seeking available crime victims' compensation benefits.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Total amount available varies depending on the amount of fines collected from federal cases.

JUVENILE ACCOUNTABILITY INCENTIVE BLOCK GRANT (JAIBG)

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Crime Commission

PURPOSE: To hold juvenile offenders accountable for their actions.

ELIGIBILITY: Awards and award amounts are predetermined by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention for local communities eligible to receive \$5,000 or more. Remaining dollars and their use are determined by the Nebraska Juvenile Justice Coalition.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Amount varies.

DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG)

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Economic Development

PURPOSE: To provide Nebraskans with appropriate, affordable and accessible housing and infrastructure, and quality jobs. CDBG funds must be used for projects that improve community and economic environments for low- to moderate-income persons, and for local needs defined through a strategic planning process. Potential applications fall into five categories:

Community Development (Public Works and Water/Wastewater), Housing and Planning applications are competitively ranked and favor projects that:

- Meet locally identified needs
- Commit local resources
- Benefit 51% of low to moderate income persons
- Eliminate slums and blight

Economic Development applications are reviewed for evidence of:

- Support of businesses that expand the state's economic base and/or
- Job creation or retention for persons in the low- to moderate-income levels

ELIGIBILITY:

Eligible Community Development Projects:

Public works— under 50,000 population community centers; senior centers exclusively for persons aged

62 and over; nonprofit centers for day care, primary health and mental health clinics; remodel shelter facilities for the homeless (excludes costs for operation); accredited public libraries; fire and/or rescue buildings, including fire trucks; removal of architectural barriers from city/village halls or county courthouses for accessibility; parks (a new facility/improvement or a quantifiable increase of an existing facility/improvement); water distribution and/or sewer collection; street, curb, gutter, sidewalk, or storm sewer; flood control and drainage; and tornado-safe shelters in manufactured home park.

Water/Wastewater—Publicly-owned water system improvements including: preliminary engineering reports; final engineering design; water source, treatment, storage, distribution; sanitary sewer treatment or collection.

Eligible Housing Projects:

Owner-occupied housing rehabilitation

Eligible Planning Projects:

Community strategic planning including: environmental needs assessment, citizen participation, downtown revitalization, and fiscal management, analyses of impediments and barriers to fair housing choice, Neighborhood/comprehensive/strategic development plans. Functional or special studies for: housing, infrastructure, community economic development, land use/ regulatory measures, main street improvement district, downtown revitalization, energy conservation and transportation. Environmental, heritage tourism, and historic preservation studies. Pre-engineering studies for publicly owned water/wastewater projects.

Eligible Economic Development Projects:

Block grants will assist economic development through loans, deferred loans, public works improvements and job training.

Eligible Tourism Development Projects:

Tourist attractions, which include historic restorations; scientific and educational interpretive educational sites and facilities such as museums; participatory sports facilities; convention centers; cultural and heritage recreational sites and facilities; and supporting activities that include removal of material and architectural barriers that restrict the mobility and accessibility to sites/facilities (for elderly and severely disabled persons) in support of eligible tourism attractions.

Eligible Downtown Revitalization Projects:

Facilities are eligible under Community Development Public Works category. Loans to businesses for façade improvements, meeting community codes, and historic restoration, rehab and preservation. Communities of 20,000 and under and that are an Economic Development Certified Community are eligible for the Downtown Revitalization funds.

Eligible Comprehensive Revitalization Projects (3 years funding):

Includes housing and public works activities for communities with populations over 20,000, but under 50,000. Minimum CR: \$175,000.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY:

Maximum Community Development Grant Amounts:

All community development grants require a minimum 25% match of the total project activity costs.

\$350,000 – under 50,000 population (Public Works and Water/Wastewater)

Maximum Housing Grant Amounts:

\$400,000—housing rehab/owner-occupied rehab

Maximum Planning Grant Amount:

All planning activities require a minimum 25% match of the total project activity costs.

\$30,000 – for a community/unincorporated county

\$50,000 – for multi-community, countywide or regional

Maximum Economic Development Grant/Loan Amount:

All economic development grants/loans require a minimum 50% match of the total project activity costs.

\$500,000—amount based on job creation

\$250,000—job training

\$250,000—speculative building

\$250,000—speculative industrial park

Maximum Tourism Development Grant Amount:

All tourism development grants require a minimum 25% match of the total project activity costs.

\$300,000 and a minimum of \$50,000.

Maximum Downtown Revitalization Grant Amount:

All downtown revitalization grants require a minimum 25% match of the total project activity costs.

\$30,000—planning

\$350,000—activities

Minimum Comprehensive Revitalization Amount

All comprehensive revitalization grants/loans require a minimum 1:1 leverage of the total project activity costs.

\$175,000 minimum funding level

THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE ACT (CDAA)

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Economic Development

PURPOSE: This program was created in 1985 by the Nebraska Legislature to encourage businesses and individuals to financially support community betterment organizations in their efforts to implement community service and development projects in chronic economically distressed areas. CDAA empowers the Nebraska Department of Economic Development to distribute 40 percent state tax credits to businesses, corporations, insurance firms, financial institutions, or individuals that make eligible contributions of cash, services or materials to approved community betterment projects. An applicant must apply to the department to become qualified to award tax credits to eligible contributors. Upon project approval by the department, the applicant can award a state tax credit to a business, corporation, insurance firm, financial institution, or individual contributing to the project of up to 40 percent of the value of the contribution. Eligible projects consist of; job training, human and medical services, physical facility and neighborhood development services, recreational and educational activities, and crime prevention.

ELIGIBILITY: An applicant must be a village, city or county government, or a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization designated by the Internal Revenue Service. The area served by the project must be designated by the department as an area of chronic economic distress, defined by the Legislature as an area that exceeds the state averages in the following categories: unemployment exceeding state average over past 2 years; per capita income below statewide average per capita income; population loss between two most recent federal decennial censuses.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: No more than \$25,000 in tax credits for any single project during any single fiscal year. A total of \$350,000 in state tax credits is allocated each fiscal year by the department.

NEBRASKA AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROGRAM

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Economic Development

PURPOSE: This program provides loans or grants to nonprofits, local governments, and public housing authorities to: 1) build new rental units for low-to moderate-income persons; 2) adapt a building from another use, such as an old school, or hotel to housing; 3) rehabilitate an existing rental property to meet DED Rehabilitation Standards; 4) administer a down payment assistance program (that can include new single family housing developments); 5) administer a program to assist homeowners in rehabilitating their houses. Anyone working on a possible Nebraska Affordable Housing Program (NAHP) project is strongly encouraged to contact a housing team member to discuss and review before the application due date. Other resources for housing activities in Nebraska include loans, grants, and assistance to individuals. ELIGIBILITY: All beneficiaries of housing funds must be low-to moderate-income earners. The NAHP assists nonprofits, local governments, and public housing authorities, which in turn assist individuals.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Varies

BUILDING ENTREPRENEURIAL COMMUNITIES ACT

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Economic Development with assistance provided by the Rural Development Commission

PURPOSE: The Building Entrepreneurial Communities Program supports economically depressed rural areas of Nebraska in building entrepreneurial communities through grants that create community capacity to build and sustain programs that generate and retain wealth in the community and region. The Department of Economic Development, with assistance provided by the Rural Development Commission, has established and administers a grant process to provide grants to two or more local units of government or census tracts that are collaborating on a project related to the purpose of the Building Entrepreneurial Communities Program with priority given to projects that best alleviate chronic economic distress. *(Exception: Planning grants may be applied for by a single applicant who is in a Limited Resource Area without a partnering entity. See "Planning Grants" on page [c].)*

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible applicants include local units of government or census tracts. At least two local units of government or census tracts must collaborate on the project. At least one of the units of government or census tracts must have ***chronic economic distress*** as indicated by:

1. An unemployment rate that exceeds the statewide average unemployment rate;
2. A per capita income below the statewide average per capita income; or
3. **A population loss between the two most recent federal decennial censuses.**

OR meet the ***limited resource area*** criteria as indicated by:

1. A per capita income below the statewide average per capita income by at least twenty percent; or
2. A population loss in the previous 20 years of at least twenty percent.

Eligible activities must be projects that address one (or more) of the following:

1. Provide education and technical assistance to energize small business development and entrepreneurship;
2. Provide technical assistance to facilitate small business transfer;
3. Build community business capacity and leadership programs;
4. Generate opportunities that will attract and retain young people and families;
5. Provide education about philanthropy and intergenerational transfer of wealth;
6. Build community endowments to support these activities; *(Note: this grant is NOT seed money for endowments, it is for education on how to build endowments.)*
7. Establish community initiatives to attract new residents; and

8. Provide marketing assistance to communities to attract new residents from outside the State of Nebraska. Marketing assistance may include the creation of new web sites, the improvement of existing web sites, creation and distribution of printed or electronic marketing materials, and programs that promote the community to new residents. *(Note: this activity requires you to market OUTSIDE the State of Nebraska.)*

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Grant recipients have two years from the date of grant announcement to expend the grant funds. **No local unit of government or census tract shall receive funding for more than one project in a fiscal year.** Grants may be requested for any amount of \$500 and above.

Planning Grants: The maximum amount for an award is **\$5,000**.

Coalition Project Grants: The maximum amount for an award is **\$75,000**

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

EVEN START FAMILY LITERACY PROJECT

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Education

PURPOSE: The Even Start Family Literacy Program serves educationally disadvantaged families by integrating early childhood, adult and parent education into family-centered programs that assist children in reaching their full potential and provide literacy and parenting education for adults.

New grants are awarded from October 1 to September 30. The grant may be extended for a total of four (4) years with continuation proposals due annually. In the initial year, the local match can be no less than 10 percent of the total budget. This share increases each year until Year 4 when the local match can be no less than 40 percent.

Grantees are expected to demonstrate local capacity to assume the program in Year 5. While former grantees are eligible to reapply, these applications will not receive special consideration in the review process. The federal share for reapplying projects will not exceed 50 percent in the new cycle.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible applicants are local education agencies (including educational service units in collaboration with a community-based organization, public agency, institution of higher education, or other nonprofit organization), or community-based organizations or other nonprofit organizations of demonstrated quality applying in collaboration with a local education agency.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: The federal law requires that the federal share never be less than \$75,000; consequently, these grants are intended to operate a comprehensive program serving a substantial population. Due to federal budget constraints, funding is not available this year, but will hopefully be made available in the following years.

DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY

COMMUNITY LAKES RESTORATION ASSISTANCE GRANTS: NON-POINT SOURCE POLLUTION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM – SEC. 319, CLEAN WATER ACT

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality

PURPOSE: Restoration, involving sediment removal, shoreline stabilization, habitat improvement and watershed protection, or a water body less than 20 acres that lies within or immediately adjacent to a community jurisdictional boundary and provides a high value resource for community recreation.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible applicants are subunits of government, educational institutions, and nonprofit organizations.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Approximately \$150,000 in annual funding is available. Applicant must provide a 40% non-federal cash or in-kind match. Maximum award is generally limited to \$75,000. Projects are limited to three years.

GRANT PROCESS SCHEDULE: Proposals are received and reviewed quarterly. Applications are individually invited pending technical review, site evaluation and availability of funds.

URBAN RUNOFF MANAGEMENT ASSISTANCE GRANTS: NON-POINT SOURCE POLLUTION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM – SEC. 319, CLEAN WATER ACT

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality

PURPOSE: Installation or retrofitting of Best Management Practices for controlling non-point source contaminants in urban runoff. Projects must implement sustainable practices in a small limited area and address a specific pollutant(s) of concern. Funding available only for non-regulatory activities.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible applicants are subunits of government, educational institutions, and nonprofit organizations.

BROWNFIELDS ASSISTANCE

PURPOSE: Section 128(a) Assessments are environmental site assessments that provide preliminary environmental information to determine if there is contamination on a property. These environmental site assessments generally are Phase I and Phase II Environmental Site Assessments (ESA), but can tailor the assessment to what the community needs. The Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ) offers these assessments to communities **at no cost**.

ELIGIBILITY: NDEQ performs ESAs for interested parties at eligible sites. Interested parties may include communities and counties planning to redevelop sites that may be contaminated.

Projects benefiting the community will be considered. Organizations that represent community interests including city or county government, non-profit economic development organizations, and regional councils of government are eligible. For-profit development organizations and individuals who are responsible for causing the contamination are not generally eligible.

Eligible sites are those meeting the definition of a brownfield. Certain sites are excluded from the program including, but not limited to, sites under an order or permit from a federal cleanup program.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Section 128(a) ESA's are free to communities. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) provides funding to the NDEQ to operate this program..

GRANT PROCESS SCHEDULE: Interested parties should contact the NDEQ's Voluntary Cleanup Program (VCP) Coordinator to discuss their proposed project.

1. Interested parties must obtain access to the property for the purposes of allowing the NDEQ and its contractor to work there.
2. A [Section 128\(a\) Assessment Application](#) and [Access Agreement](#) must be completed and submitted to the VCP Coordinator.
3. NDEQ reviews the application and determine the eligibility of the site and availability of funds.
4. Upon approval of the work, NDEQ tasks its contractor to conduct the work.
5. Upon completion of the work, a report is submitted to the applicant and site owner.

NDEQ and the applicant will discuss the results of the findings and possible next steps.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES SYSTEM

CHILD CARE GRANT FUND

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Health and Human Services System

1. CHILD CARE GRANT: Awards a maximum of \$5,000 for Family Child Care Homes, and \$10,000 for Child Care Centers. Candidates must meet at least one of the following criteria:

1. Be a **new** (not yet licensed) program making minor building modifications that are absolutely necessary to meet licensing requirements
2. Making minor building modifications or purchasing equipment to **increase the number of slots** (licensing capacity) available for infants, children with special needs, and/or school-aged children;
3. Making minor building modifications for licensed providers **expanding their child care** from a Family Child Care Home I to a Family Child Care Home II, or expanding a Family Child Care Home II to a Child Care Center.

(Supporting documentation must be included)

2. EMERGENCY MINI-GRANT: Awards a maximum of \$1,000 for facilities holding a provisional license, and \$2,000 for facilities holding an operating license. Requested items must be currently required to meet licensing regulations. Supporting inspection documentation must be included.

3. QUALITY IMPROVEMENT GRANT: Awards a maximum of \$500 for Family Child Care Homes or Child Care Centers who are currently serving low-income families. Requested items must be related to improving the quality of care provided. Allowable and non-allowable expenditures are listed in the application packet.

Childcare facilities may apply for only one type of grant, and, once funded, may not reapply for three years. Each grant is awarded monthly, and must be postmarked by the **first** day of the month to be considered for that month's cycle.

Please be aware that candidates are not "entitled" to Child Care Grant funds. The awarding of grant funds indicates an agreement between the childcare facility and Health and Human Services to:

- Provide licensed child care for a minimum of **three** consecutive years;
- Use the grant money for its intended purpose;
- Serve children whose care is subsidized by Health and Human Services; and
- Continue to maintain compliance with licensing regulations.

As such, the licensing compliance history (if applicable) of each candidate will be reviewed, and the names of candidates will be checked against the Child and Adult Abuse Central Registries *before* any grant funds are awarded. Those candidates who have had problems in these areas will most likely **not** be funded. In addition, the grant fund process has been very competitive; often there are more applications for funding than available funds to fulfill the requests.

There are certain criteria that will be measured when awarding the grant funds. Candidates must clearly demonstrate the **need** for childcare in the area. If there are several child care facilities already serving low-income families in that area, this need may not exist. Also, if the candidate does not **own** the childcare property, items such as fences, fire safety/smoke detection equipment, lead paint abatement, etc., will not

be funded. Pay close attention to the enclosed allowable and non-allowable expenditures inserts included in the packet.

The grant review process involves several steps. Each application will first be reviewed to insure it is complete and includes the proper supporting documentation; incomplete applications will be returned to the candidate. The appropriate background checks and licensing compliance history for each candidate will also be reviewed, and a committee of agency staff will examine each grant application to determine whether it will be funded. This entire process may take six to eight weeks. Candidates who are not selected for funding may reapply at a later date.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION FUND PROGRAM GRANTS

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services

PURPOSE: For programs designed to aid in the prevention of child abuse/neglect. A program may be funded for a maximum of three years, depending on approval of the annual submission of the grant application. Each year the amount of funding will be decreased by 25% of the amount awarded in the first year. Programs not submitted in consecutive years will receive decreased funding upon resubmission and approval. Child Abuse Prevention Program Grants have the following restrictions:

1. Agencies and organizations may submit a proposal for a specific project in only one funding category. Agencies are allowed to submit more than one proposal if the proposals are for separate projects.
2. Reports are required for all program categories. Failure to submit required reports may affect opportunities for continued funding.
3. Cost for attendance at conferences will not be funded. Funding for equipment, such as typewriters, computers, etc., will be reviewed separately.

ELIGIBILITY: Organizations whose goals, expertise or experience is in the area of child abuse prevention are eligible to apply for grants from the Child Abuse Prevention Fund. Preference is given to nonprofit organizations.

About 80% of Nebraska's PHHS Block Grant funds are awarded annually on a non-competitive basis to programs within the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. Currently, internal projects are focused on diabetes control and prevention, unintentional and intentional injury prevention, laboratory testing for STDs and HIV, minority health, public health infrastructure, data collection and analysis, worksite wellness and sexual assault prevention. As alternative funding becomes available to a project, support from the PHHS Block Grant is discontinued and funds are reassigned to other priority health topics.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Current competitive external projects range from \$25,000 to \$35,000. (All awards are subject to the availability of sufficient Federal funding.)

TITLE V MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH (MCH) BLOCK GRANT

Federal legislation mandates that at least 30% of the Title V/MCH Block Grant funds be used for Type 2 and at least 30% be used for Type 3. There is no minimum amount specified for Type 1.

ELIGIBILITY: Nebraska public and nonprofit entities, and federally recognized American Indian Tribes headquartered in Nebraska are eligible to apply for the portion of the federal block grant that is subgranted.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: As the recipient of the federal grant funds, the Nebraska Health and Human Services System subgrants or allocates a portion of Nebraska's MCH/Title V Block Grant to community-based groups to address local needs. Approximately \$4 million is received annually, of which about one-half is subgranted. Subawards to individual agencies/groups vary. The remainder of the federal funds is allocated primarily for population-based services and infrastructure at the state-level.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

NEBRASKA WORKER TRAINING PROGRAM

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Labor

PURPOSE: Support of public-private training, retraining and upgrading of existing Nebraska workers. The program goals are to enhance productivity through training, and increase overall education and skill levels of Nebraskans to excel in the workplace and successfully compete in the global marketplace. This will be done through investment in human resources – develop skills, enhance earning capacity, job security, career advancement – retention and expansion of Nebraska’s workforce, and by meeting industry workforce needs for skills critical to product diversification. Individual businesses decide the type of training needed, the training provider, and method of delivery.

ELIGIBILITY: All established businesses that possess an Unemployment Insurance Account Number and are in compliance with the reporting and payment requirements of the Nebraska Employment Security Law can participate. Labor organizations providing apprenticeship training programs registered with the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training, Employment and Training Administration, United States Department of Labor, are also eligible.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: Approximately \$400,000 in funding is available each quarter. It is the intent of the Program that consideration shall be given to the size, type of industry, and geographic location of grant applicants when distributing funds. It is the goal of the Program that 20% of grant funds will be awarded to small businesses (less than 100 employees), 20% to mid-sized businesses (100 – 499 employees), 20% to large businesses (500 or more employees), and up to 40% for special training projects and apprenticeship training programs. Matching contributions should be provided by the employer in an amount at least equal to the grant funds requested. Matching private funding that exceeds the grant funds requested will be considered as an indication of the applicant’s commitment to training. Employee wages or equipment used in training may be considered as an in-kind contribution.

GRANT PROCESS SCHEDULE: Grants are awarded quarterly. Deadlines for submission of the grant application are March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31.

DEPARTMENT OF ROADS

TRAFFIC SAFETY GRANT PROGRAM

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Office of Highway Safety (NOHS)

PURPOSE: To provide funding assistance to counties and communities to initiate projects that address identified traffic safety-related problems, specifically:

- alcohol
- speed
- occupant protection
- youth

ELIGIBILITY: Nonprofit organizations and government agencies are eligible to apply for funding assistance. Three years of baseline information must be incorporated into the application, including statistics addressing crashes, injuries, fatalities, DWI and moving violation contracts, or other traffic crash-related statistics that support the problem. Copies of the agency's Drug Free Workplace Policy and Seat Belt Use Policy must be submitted with the proposal.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: \$10,000 - \$60,000 (other amounts will be considered). Applicants are encouraged to "leverage" funds requested from the NOHS with staff, financial, or other resources that they are able to contribute to the proposed project. Projects may be considered for funding assistance for up to three consecutive years with annual contracts between the NOHS and the funded project. Funding assistance is to be used as "start up" or "seed money" to implement a project. A cost assumption plan is required as part of the initial application, describing how the applicant plans to continue the project activity after NOHS funding assistance expires.

GRANT PROCESS SCHEDULE: Applications become available in late April and are usually due in mid-May (contact the NOHS for specific dates). Applications are competitively ranked based on problem identification/need, measurable and realistic objectives/methods, evaluation methods, budget proposal, cost assumption, and innovation. Projects follow the federal fiscal year, beginning October 1 and concluding September 30 of the following year.

TRANSPORTATION ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR)

PURPOSE: This program provides funding to local, regional, and state government entities to construct and restore transportation facilities that are not eligible for funding through other programs. Examples of projects that would be eligible include trails, development of scenic byways, restoration of historic transportation facilities, and other projects directly related to the historic, current or future transportation infrastructure. The transportation enhancements program developed for Nebraska is not intended for major long-term transportation projects. Rather, the intent of the program is to assist governmental entities in accomplishing smaller, user-effective projects over a relatively shorter period.

Projects must fall into one or more of the following activities related to surface transportation:

- facilities for pedestrians and bicycles
- safety and educational activities for pedestrians and bicyclists
- acquisition of scenic easements, and scenic or historic sites
- scenic or historic highway programs (including tourist and welcome center facilities)
- landscaping and other scenic beautification
- historic preservation
- rehabilitation of historic transportation buildings, structures, or facilities (including historic railroad facilities)
- preservation of abandoned railway corridors (including conversion and use as pedestrian/bicycle trails)
- control and removal of outdoor advertising
- archaeological planning and research
- environmental mitigation to address water pollution due to highway runoff or to reduce vehicle-caused wildlife mortality while maintaining habitat connectivity
- establishment of transportation museums

The Nebraska Transportation Enhancement Program reserves the right to prioritize categories for funding.

ELIGIBILITY: Most state and local governmental agencies or political subdivisions within the state of Nebraska are eligible to apply. This includes local units of government (villages, cities and counties), natural resource districts, Nebraska state agencies, the University of Nebraska, and tribal governments. Certain other governmental entities also may be eligible to apply. Please contact the NDOR Transportation Enhancement Coordinator at (402) 479-4881 for clarification.

We recognize that many fine private nonprofit and civic organizations will have a strong interest in and support for use of these funds. Therefore, we encourage interested advocacy groups to work with appropriate local, regional and state governmental units (including NDOR's eight district offices) to develop project applications.

Proof must be provided that your project will meet at least three initial criteria to qualify for enhancement funding:

- The project must fit within the eligibility activities;
- The applicant must provide at least a 20% non-federal cash match of total project costs;
- The government entity must commit to provide future maintenance of the project.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY: No more than \$500,000 for any individual project. This amount represents the maximum federal funding limit (80%) exclusive of the matching funds provided by the applicant.

NEBRASKA GAME AND PARKS COMMISSION

RECREATIONAL TRAILS PROGRAM FUND

SPONSORING AGENCY: Federal Highway Administration

PURPOSE: The purpose of financial assistance through RTP is to provide public trails and trail-related development and restoration funding to political subdivisions in Nebraska for recreational trails. Private organizations, individuals, and corporations may assist the grant applicants on the project through their contributions of funding, but they CANNOT be the project sponsor or the financial pass-through. RTP is specifically to provide recreation trails, so transportation connections/commuter trails will be referred to Nebraska's Transportation Enhancement program.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligible grant sponsors are political subdivisions and they may enlist the assistance of individuals, private organizations or corporations for funding and construction of the project in accordance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations.

Eligible projects are trail development, trail related support facilities, renovation and repair of trails and trail support facilities and acquisition of land for trails. Sponsors must have ownership or control (lease or easement) of the trail corridor or property that will be developed. Land for trails may be acquired ONLY on a willing buyer/willing seller basis. Federal assistance up to 80% from the RTP is allowed to match a project's cost or up to \$150,000.00.

The program funds may be used to develop new trails and related elements such as bridges, culverts, grading, seeding, etc.; trail restoration, maintenance of trails, construct support facilities such as parking and access points, trail heads, kiosks, etc., restoration of trail support facilities; acquisitions of easements and fee simple land interests from a willing seller/willing buyer basis; trail linkages; and reasonable architecture and engineering services incurred during the approved project period. Assurance that the landowner is a willing seller will be part of the required documentation if acquiring land or an easement on land. Non-motorized trails must be, at minimum, eight feet wide unless the application is for connector trails that connect two or more existing trails. See policies, pages 9 and 10 on minimum width of trails.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY:

The RTP Committee has set a limit on the amount of funding a political subdivision can receive. The minimum grant requirement is \$20,000 and the maximum grant amount that can be requested is \$150,000 for projects. The minimum or maximum grant amount request can be waived for trail applications if requested via letter, which includes justification as to why they are requesting the waiver. The Committee will determine if the waiver request is justifiable.

LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND

SPONSORING AGENCY: Nebraska Game and Parks Commission

PURPOSE: Goals of the LWCF State Assistance Program (state and local government matching grants) are to:

- Meet state and locally identified public outdoor recreation resource needs to strengthen the health and vitality of the American People.
- Increase the number of protected state and local outdoor recreation resources and to ensure their availability for public use in perpetuity.
- Encourage sound planning and long-term partnerships to expand the quantity and to ensure the quality of needed state and local outdoor recreation resources.

ELIGIBILITY:

Eligible projects include, but are not limited to ball fields, soccer fields, picnicking facilities, playgrounds, park acquisition and development, shelter houses, trails, and related support facilities.

FUNDING AVAILABILITY:

The LWCF is a reimbursable grant, meaning the project sponsor must finance 100 percent of the project. Project sponsor may then request reimbursement for half of all eligible expenses up to the amount of the approved grant. To be eligible for reimbursement, all costs must be incurred and paid by the project sponsor during the project period as identified on the grant agreement. Reimbursement request may be periodically submitted or final billed upon project completion.

Project sponsors may not take title to land or begin development until after the project is approved by the National Park Service. Expenses for planning and engineering which are necessary to prepare the proposal for submission are eligible project costs if they are documented as pre-agreement costs in the application. These are the only eligible pre-agreement costs. If any other work is performed or title to land is accepted prior to federal approval of the project, the expenses incurred are ineligible for reimbursement.

Project Sponsor's Matching Share

The project sponsor is required to provide documentation that the required match is on hand and allocated to the proposed project. If the match will be derived from organizations or foundations, provide evidence that the funds are readily available and will be donated to the project when needed by the sponsor. Projects to be funded with bond issue proceeds will not be considered prior to the passage of the bond issue. Under these circumstances, provide evidence that the bond issue has already been passed.

GRANT PROCESS SCHEDULE: Submit one original and two copies of the application and all supporting documents to the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission by October 1st.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA)

COMMUNITY FACILITY PROGRAMS

SPONSORING AGENCY: USDA Rural Development

PURPOSE: To provide funding for the development of essential community facilities in rural communities. The types of facilities that can be funded are:

- Health care
- Public safety
- Fire and rescue
- Cultural
- Educational
- Other public improvements that are essential to the quality of life and orderly development of rural communities
- Recreation (can only be funded under the guaranteed program)

ELIGIBILITY: This program is only available to public entities, nonprofit corporations, and Indian tribes. These organizations must be unable to fund projects from their own resources or through commercial credit at reasonable rates and terms. The entity however, must be financially sound and have the legal authority to own and operate the facility and to borrow and repay loans. Financial assistance also is limited to rural communities with populations of 20,000 or less.

Funding may be provided through:

GUARANTEED COMMUNITY FACILITY LOANS

Commercial lenders originate and service these loans. USDA's involvement consists of providing a loan guarantee to the issuing bank to offer protection against risk. Guarantees are available on 100 percent of the project cost. There are no minimum equity or down payment requirements. Rates and terms are negotiated between the lender and applicant. Interest rates can be fixed or variable and the maximum term cannot exceed 40 years. However, no repayment period will exceed any statutory limitation on the organization's borrowing authority or the useful project feasibility, reasonable project cost, and cash flow. Guaranteed loan can be leveraged with other private and public funding sources. Funding under this program is unlimited.

DIRECT COMMUNITY FACILITY LOANS

The USDA Rural Development originates and issues these loans. The maximum term is 40 years. However, no repayment period will exceed any statutory limitation on the organization's borrowing authority or the useful life of the improvement or facility. The interest rate offered will depend on the median household income of the service area of the project. This funding is considered a temporary source of credit and borrowers could be asked to refinance their loans in the future if they are financially able to do so without causing a hardship. Funding for this program is limited and will normally need to be leveraged with other funding sources.

COMMUNITY FACILITY GRANTS

Assistance is available on a graduated scale based on the service areas' median household income and population.

<u>GRANT</u>		<u>CF Population</u>
• MHI for 75% Grant:	<\$23,209	5,000 or less
• MHI for 55% Grant:	<\$27,077	12,000 or less
• MHI for 35% Grant:	<\$30,945	20,000 or less

- MHI for 15% Grant: <\$34,813 20,000 or less

The maximum amount available for any project cannot exceed \$100,000. This type of assistance will only be considered when applicants cannot meet funding needs through their own resources or loan assistance. Priority for funding will be for small rural communities with very low incomes. Funding for this program is limited and leveraging with other funding sources is recommended. To be considered for grant funds, both the median household income and the population requirements must be met.

Applications are originated and processed through the USDA Rural Development Area Offices.
